### District looks to upgrade through bond

Early voting begins Monday for the May 4 election, and Allen voters will decide on two City Council places and the future of a bond proposal for the Allen school district.

Amy Gnadt and Kelley Rowley ran unopposed for School Board places 4 and 5 respectively.

The \$422,800,000 proposed bond would fund several school renovations and upgrades, technology expansion, more buses and added security. If approved, the sale of bonds would not increase the existing Allen ISD debt service tax rate.

According to the district, the proposal originated from the Allen ISD Project SOAR Facilities Committee, a citizen's committee formed by the board in October 2018 to review the district's facility needs. ### In case of emergency

**STAFF REPORT** 

New tools for handling public works emergencies will soon be headed to Allen.

In 2018, city staff applied for a Homeland Security Grant through the Office of the Governor to fund an emergency response trailer and equipment. The trailer will be stocked with emergency barricades, chain saws, water pumps,

small generators, safety vests and other personal protective equipment. The gear can be used by Allen or regional partners to respond to public works emergencies or other incidents.

The trailer and equipment carry a \$43,000 price tag, covered by the Homeland Security Grant. The city will store the trailer and pay for maintenance when necessary.

### City addresses traffic flow

**STAFF REPORT** 

Allen is investing in new signal sensors to help improve traffic flow.

The sensors track approaching vehicles from up to 600 feet away, then count the number of cars in each lane using radar and video detection. This allows traffic engineers to adjust signal timing the \$164,000 expense.

The original Southfork Ranch for the famed television show Dallas was on Preston Road in Frisco and owned by the Cloyce Box family. The Box family was once a formidable player in the Texas business world, controlling a diverse portfolio of public and private companies, especially oil and gas, cement manufacturing, and real estate.
